commodore's comments



I attended the Junior Program end-of-the-summer awards banquet. Most impressive was the huge group of people that was enjoying the evening. Over 200 dinners were served. As the instructors were announcing the various awards, it was clear to me that the kids had learned basic sailing and racing skills they will appreciate for the rest of their lives, they met new friends, and above all it appeared they had fun!! Junior Program Director Jeremy Davidson and his staff did an outstanding job. The summer program was also successful because parents and grandparents were here every day giving encouragement to their children. They took time out of their busy schedules to come to Tuesday night twilights and travel to San Diego and Newport Beach for regattas. This kind of support was invaluable to the program. Families were enjoying ABYC.

ABYC members are for the most part one design and small boat sailors. Recently it dawned on me that one of our major strengths is that we are organized by fleets. The advantage of the fleets is members meet with and compete against each other frequently and staff regattas, and social events. This builds strong relationships. The fleets are also a major weakness, because fleet members tend to congregate with members of their own fleet and do not interact with the rest of the membership. Here in is an opportunity. The family fleet, an all inclusive group dedicated to sponsor events for the whole family such as the Christmas Party and Easter Brunch. Saint Patrick's Day party is becoming a favorite for the younger kids. Other events such as a regatta for dad, mom, and the older kids could include a day at the beach for those not sailing, games for the younger children, all followed by a picnic. The 4th of July would be a great time for such an event. All of us are members of the family fleet. We just are not organized as such. Maybe one of you will volunteer to be our fleet captain.

As the year draws to a close I would like to take the opportunity to reflect on what has transpired. First, thank you, the membership, for giving me the opportunity to serve as your commodore. Second, I thank my wife Georgia, for being so understanding. And lastly, thank you to all the volunteers, ABYC staff, committee members, and the board of directors for our many successes.

2003 has been a year of cultural change for ABYC. We knew it would be a challenge from the start.

Our focus this year was to maintain our ABYC tradition of social events, regattas and the junior program yet gain an understanding of the influence of current health and environmental laws and regulations affecting private clubs. A few bumps were encountered along the way, and we are still learning from the experience.

At the March general membership meeting and through subsequent articles in the Sou' Wester we informed you of the risks of non-compliance to the current laws and regulations. This has prompted change in policy, mainly in food preparation. It also means that our kitchen and galley facility need to be updated. Results of the Maintenance Improvement survey indicate your support for these much needed improvements, and a conceptual design is under way.

Also in process is a long-range financial plan which incorporates operating expenses, major improvements, major acquisitions and the 2020 fund. The plan will provide insight as to future income required to meet these requirements. The intent of the plan is to provide a roadmap to financially sound future.

Meanwhile we have been operating since 1998 without increasing dues. In 2000 an additional five dollars were dedicated to increase the 2020 fund. However, inflation has caught up with us, and it is probable that we will need to initiate a dues increase. Up to now we have worked very hard to control costs and gain revenue from other sources, and we will continue to do so.

Director Rich Kempster and the membership committee worked hard to improve both the volunteer and membership recruitment processes. They put in place a quarterly event volunteer sign up sheet, streamlined the method by which junior members join ABYC, and provided incentives for current members to sponsor new members. Here is where we really need your help. If you know anyone interested in joining ABYC, please encourage them to do so.

Adding to the challenge this year was our manager, Daniel, leaving mid year and the job search that followed. I am confident that ABYC will be much improved by Theresa Laird as our new manager.

Throughout this year of change our sailing and social events have been outstanding. Even the weather on Opening Day did not rain on our parade. We just did the ceremony inside for the first time. We continue to get praise for our innovation and professionalism from our many visitors. Thank you all.

Chuck Tripp also took overall Laser honors with that 15 boat fleet being decided in the last race. In Etchells, Ed Feo won on a tie breaker with Tom Corkett. Bob Falk took Laser Radials. We also hosted Thistles and a fleet of Olson 30s who had sailed in a race from Santa Monica Bay to Seal Beach YC on Saturday.

Bay classes were run by PRO Marc Schryer. Senior Sabots had a competitive 9 boat fleet, with 5 points separating the top 6 places. Bruce Golison won with a third in the last race, beating Chris McNaboe by 1 point. Visiting clubs dominated Sabot B's, with Rex Cameron from SDYC winning easily. Eight new sailors competed in C3. Although LBYC and ABYC sailors had a large showing, Perry Emsiek from Balboa took top honors with 3 bullets. Since the ABYC Lido fleet was volunteering for the event, and the Mission Bay Lidos stayed home this year, the 3 boat Lido fleet was won by Parker and John O'Brien from Balboa.

After six months of sailing and 36 individual races, the 2003 Alamos Bay Etchells Fleet Championship Series came to a resounding end as Tom Corkett claimed the title. He jumped to an early lead, dominating in all conditions on all venues, and was challenged only by one team throughout the year.

And what a challenge! Greg Sims and Doug Menezes, sailing only their second full season in an Etchells, finished a strong second in the standings, 'way ahead of the next team. In most of the fleet regattas and Holiday Series events that made up the Fleet Championship Series, they were both faster and smarter than most of the rest of the fleet, a tribute to their active racing schedule that included a regular racing against the best Etchells sailors in California off San Diego.

Past Fleet Champion Steve Moffett finished a distant third place just ahead of 2000 runners-up Tim Carter and Chris Ericksen. John Chapman was fifth and multiple past Fleet Champion Ed Feo finished in sixth place.

The "rookies of the year" title went to Jeff Powell and Gordon Dudley, who finished in seventh place. The rest of the standings went to sailors who missed most of the series: in order, they were Jerry Montgomery, Doug Jorgensen, Paul Ancil and Kevin Ellis, Larry Harvey, Chris Wells and Tim Harriman.

Here are the point totals for the series, which was a high-point series wherein each boat got a point for starting and one for each starter it finished ahead of, with a twenty per cent discard.

The drama of the 2003 Fleet Championship Series was somewhat overshadowed as the regatta became a dogfight between Ed Feo, sailing with Mark Rastello and Tim Patrick, and Tom Corkett, sailing with Wayne Rodgers and Michel Meader: at the end of eight races and one discard, the pair ended in a dead heat, and the tiebreaker came down to who beat whom in the last race. The nod went to Feo, with Corkett and Company carding second in the event.

While this went on, there was another dogfight for third place among Tim Carter and Chris Ericksen, sailing with a pickup crew, Joe Sorosky; Steve Moffett, sailing with Kevin Ellis both days and with Paul Ancil and Jim Bateman one day each; and Greg Sims and Doug Menezes, sailing with their regular third, Chuck Simmons. Greg and Doug lay in third place ahead of Carter/Ericksen and Moffett at the end of the first day of racing, but pressure from the other two teams pushed them back to fifth while Carter/Ericksen moved into third and Moffett into fourth; at that, only one point separated Moffett and Menezes/Sims.
