



townsend passes jorgensen to win boxing day

Sailors entered boats in twelve different classes for the fifth annual Boxing Day Pursuit Race held on Sunday December 26th on Alamitos Bay. A perfect winters day greeted the sailors with clear skies and light breezes. Classes participating ranged from a Naples Sabot and the ever-present Snowbird, all the way to Etchells and J/30s. Tacking, jibing, spinnakers, gaff rigs, code zeroes, bloopers, bowsprits, Boxing Day regatta had it all.

With only ten minutes left before the 1pm Naples Sabot start, there was barely a breath of wind on Alamitos Bay. Almost as if on schedule, the first signs of the afternoon breeze appeared as the warning signal was sounded. At the gun a light 3 – 4 knot breeze out of the southeast had filled and the Naples Sabots leapt across the line trying to cover as much distance as they could before the faster boats started their pursuit.

The breeze slowly shifted to the south as the remaining classes started, with the Etchells finally starting one minute behind the J/30s and 55 minutes behind the Sabots.

The Etchells and J/30s were battling each other and at the same time reeling in the slower boats. Front running Jack Jorgensen was leading Robin Townsend by a few boat lengths, with the remainder of a highly competitive Naples Sabot fleet waiting for an opportunity to take the lead. The leading Snowbird was closing the gap on the

leaders slowly but surely. Bob Daniel in his Cal 25 was getting the better of the Laser fleet and was starting to work his way through the Cal 20 fleet as well.

As the 3:16pm finish time approached, past National Champion Robin Townsend, with the finish line in sight, finally found a lane around Jorgensen to take the lead and the win. Spencer Snook from Long Beach Yacht Club rounded out the top three.

Alamitos Bay Etchells Fleet 18 kicked off 2005 with a stealth regatta: it kind of snuck up on us. Our 2005 fleet officers—myself included—forgot that we'd scheduled one of our one-day fleet regattas sailed with the Cal 20's for January 23; fortunately, the Cal 20's didn't forget and lined up Dave Kofahl to run races. So, at almost the last minute, we rounded up five boats for the four-race series and had a great time in moderate temperatures and light winds.

There were a lot of firsts on this day, the first regatta of the year. It was the first race for new ABYC member Reese Lane and co-skipper Jonathan Mitsumori. It marked the first win in a race for Jeff Powell and Gordon Dudley, who took 2004 Fleet Captain Greg Sims along as tactician. And it was the first time in a really long time we'd seen Rob Rice out with "Fast" Eddie Ureño and Pat Kelly with his regulars on board.

Both of these latter skippers had flashes of brilliance: both won a race, and Pat won two. But the day went to the steady if not brilliant performance of Tim Carter and Chris Ericksen, sailing with Tim's daughter Courtney, who scored three second-place finishes and one third to come out on top. The regatta was really close: after four races, one point separate the top four boats and there was a three-way tie for second place, broken by the tie-breaker formula. Here are the results:

The regatta follows a time-honored schedule: launching beginning at 9:00 am, a skippers' meeting at 10:00 and the first start at about 11:00. We run non-spinnaker races around the fixed marks in the Bay and include at least one race that allows the Etchells to fly their kites. It is lovely to see the Etchells ghosting along (it is usually a light-air event) along Bayshore and past Naples and Treasure Islands with their spinnakers pulling. The regatta ends soon enough for everyone to the boats hauled and put away before kickoff.

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from sou'wester's past

Regatta news is kinda slim in February SOU'WESTER's of the past, so the big news in these editions seem to be about new members and upcoming events.

THIRTY YEARS AGO: Richard Kempster, a former junior member of ABYC, became a Regular member in January, 1975, according to the February, 1975, SOU'WESTER. Another new member was Charles Merrill Kober, "known better around ABYC or country music stations as 'Booey' or 'Hambone.'" Fred and Linda Mihaylo joined as Cal 20 sailors, William and Mildred Nicholson joined with a Mariner (ketch?), and Peter Gales rejoined ABYC: he'd been a member before World War II. And John and Jinx Ellis, with their daughters Margaret Jane and Jennifer Ann, joined ABYC as well.

Regattas in February included the SCYA Midwinter Regatta and the ABYC-sponsored Honest Abe Regatta. Men's Day would be happening in March, as would the Turnbuckle Tightener. And a SEA Junior Seminar, sponsored by SEA Magazine, was scheduled for March 24-27 at ABYC; the Seminar Director was Ken Weiss.

Ann Exley apologized for having to discontinue Yoga classes. Mike McDade was accepted at the USC Graduate School...the Sabotiers were painting the stairway in the main clubhouse...the Board was considering repowering the inside race committee boat with an electric drive from Duffield Marine to get away from "the trouble-plagued outboard engine"...the annual financial report of ABYC was printed and showed that assets as of September, 1974, totaled \$344,092.

TWENTY YEARS AGO: Apparently the Super Bowl Party was a success, because most of the photos in the February, 1985, SOU'WESTER was entirely of pictures from the party. Grant Hill and Mike McDade tended bar while Jerry Thompson and Commodore Dave Dorrans stood in front; all four men sported moustaches. A bearded Mark Fowle discussed betting with a similarly bearded Bruce Conn.

Paul Ancil became a Regular member in 1985; his sponsor was Lee Smith, with whom Paul was then sailing in Lido 14's. Walter Johnson and Willem Emmer, like Paul former junior members, became Yachting members, as did Tim and Melanie Carter; they lived in Highland Park and raced an I-14 named "Rawhide."

Marty Bowman won the January Sabotier fleet race in the A's, ahead of Bernice Weiss and Don Hodges, in that order; Mildred Dressel won the B's...Steve Moffett was awarded the J/24 Fleet Championship trophy for 1984...Sabot sailor Patty Moore married J/24 sailor Chris Reno and had their reception at Virginia Country Club...Dennis and Eileen Raden were held up for eleven hours at the San Antonio airport—by snow—while on a holiday trip.

TEN YEARS AGO: A bunch of new members were introduced in January, 1995, and pictured in the SOU'WESTER of February, 1995. They included Lokke and Nancy Patrick, sponsored by Ken Nairne, and Latham and Jamie Bell, sponsored by father Dick Bell. George Caddle introduced two new families into the club and the Sabot fleet, Brian and Cynthia Brown and Lance Jackson and Juli Flynn. Al Smith introduced his two grandsons, Daniel and Nicholas Henry, as Independent Junior members. And Brian Holmes introduced his partner in the Ericson 35 as a new member: Kevin Ellis.

The New Year's Eve party was quite the extravaganza as organized by John McNaughton, Barbara Kendall and Stacy Conn: it included a blessing of the fleet, a "polar bear" swim and a New Year's Day sail aboard the tallship "Californian." It ran three days and had over two hundred attendees. Staff Commodore Norma Clapp said it was a party where "everyone danced and nobody went home until after midnight."

ABYC was preparing for the 35th annual Olympic Classes Regatta in March; Pat Bixby and Al Smith were co-chairs. And the Cal 20 NA's were coming to ABYC in August, according to Cal 20 Fleet Captain John Merchant. ABYC was also hosting the SCYA Manning Series Regatta and the Keelboat One-Design Regatta on consecutive weekends in late February and early March; it cost \$4.00 a day to park in the lots across the street.

Francis Merchant passed away in December...Paige Elizabeth Tripp, daughter of Chuck and Leslie Tripp, was born in December...the revival of the ABYC Cribbage Tournament was set for March, and a flyer said a training/practice tournament was scheduled for February 24 at Happy Hour.
